Learning Opportunity

BUILDING POSITIVE SCHOOL CLIMATE: A RESTORATIVE FRAMEWORK APPROACH

Our goal at the International Institute for Restorative Practice: Canada (IIRP Canada) is to teach school administrators, educators, counselors, and support staff how to explicitly build positive school climate and culture using restorative practices — _the science of relationships and community. Restorative Practice has been implemented in schools across Canada, from urban to rural areas. We have found that sustainable implementation in schools is most effective when school and district administrators work alongside school staff to learn restorative practices and champion the effort.

School wide implementation of restorative practices has been shown to:

- increase student connectedness and belonging;
- improve social/emotional development in students;
- create greater community and parent engagement;
- improve student attendance;
- increase high school completion rates;
- provide a context for understanding and valuing diversity; and
- decrease fights, bullying and suspensions.

RESTORATIVE PRACTICES FOR EDUCATORS OUTLINE

Day One – Restorative Practice Framework is an approach to strengthen relationships and repair harm in a way that builds community. This workshop emphasizes proactive strategies for building strong relationships, engaging students, and addressing incidents of hurt/harm.

Day Two – Using Circles Effectively provides an opportunity for educators and staff to develop skills to facilitate primarily community building circles and responsive circles to address everyday issues and conflicts.

*This workshop does not include teaching the skills required to facilitate a Restorative/Community Conference.

Caroline Gosling

Caroline retired from Edmonton Public Schools after 35 years as an educator. During that time she taught at elementary, junior and senior high, was a behavior consultant, and a principal at several schools. Caroline also spent time seconded to both Alberta Children's Services and Alberta Education focusing on supports for children, youth and families considered vulnerable and creating welcoming, caring, respectful and safe learning environments.

She holds a Masters degree in Educational Leadership and a Restorative Justice Certificate from Simon Fraser University. In her 'semi-retirement' Caroline continues to work with schools, districts and other organizations to build and enhance school culture through restorative practices. Caroline is an instructor and coach with the International Institute for Restorative Practices and currently sits on the board of the Alberta Restorative Justice Association. In addition Caroline has sat on the board of the Zebra Child Protection Centre and the Hope Foundation of Alberta.
